Our motto is “To Protect and To Serve” and the men and women of the Los Angeles Police Department stand by it. With this commitment come many untold stories which happen on a daily basis. While our officers perform their duties without regard for public acclaim, many of their stories warrant recognition. This is why the Department sets aside one day a year to recognize the selfless efforts of its officers.

Recognition Day recognizes the many sworn and civilian employees who perform their duties above and beyond the normal call to duty. Their stories might otherwise go untold. This year’s ceremony was held on December 11, 2008, at the Los Angeles Convention Center. In attendance were local, state and federal officials, elected officials and friends and family members of the recipients.

Candidates are nominated by their supervisors and are determined by distinguishing those who display bravery, heroism, saving or preserving a human life, outstanding service and exceptional performance in their daily duties. The nominations are sent to the Commendation Board for review and then sent up the chain of command for the Chief of Police approval. Depending on the type of medal to be awarded some of the awards do not need Chief of Police approval.

This year saw 437 sworn and civilian employees be recognized for their outstanding contributions to the communities they serve. With episodes of heroism and courage occurring seemingly on a daily basis, the need to recognize our true heroes remains high. □

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Chief's Message ... William J. Bratton, Chief of Police

OCTOBER - 2008

Looking back at the last six years as your Chief, we have much to be proud of. You have worked tirelessly to reduce crime and your efforts have paid off. From day one, I have based my tenure on three basic principles: Pride, Commitment and Respect – Pride in your City, your Department and yourselves; Commitment to your jobs; and the Respect we earn from the communities we serve. Because of your dedication and unrelenting efforts, the City of Los Angeles is a much safer place.

Regardless of economic conditions and social and demographic changes, among the many reasons critics cite for

causing crime to go up or down, in Los Angeles crime continues to go down largely due to your efforts. The influences cited by researchers, commentators, and political pundits are no match for the hard work and focused crime fighting efforts of you, the men and women of the Los Angeles Police Department.

Since 2002, violent crime has declined by 48.9% - that means that during this period over 18,700 fewer Angelenos were victims of violent crimes and as we near the end of 2008, the Department anticipates an unsurpassed seventh consecutive year of declining Part I crimes. We have made good on our oath to protect and to serve the people of Los Angeles and we are well on our way to achieving our Department goal of a 5% reduction in crime for the year 2008.

Because of your hard work, as of September 27, 2008, compared to the same period in 2007, we are experiencing an 9.1% decrease in homicides; a 13.4% drop in rape; robbery declined by 3.1%; aggravated assaults dipped 5.8%; burglary went down 4.8%; a 4.3% decrease in car burglaries; a 1.9% reduction in personal and other theft; and auto theft dropped 6.0%. Even more impressive, an 18.9% decrease in the number of

shooting victims.

Through effective, strategic and targeted policing initiatives, including force multiplying partnerships with our fellow City, County, State and Federal colleagues and community members, the Department continues to prevail against gang crime with declines in nearly every single category. Gang

homicides are down 25.7%, aggravated assaults down 15.7%, and gang related rapes are down 17.6%. Overall gang crime is down 10.6%. There were also 23.9% fewer victims of gang-related shootings in 2008 versus

2007.

Your consistent, compassionate and constitutional policing of this City has made the difference. Homicide rates are down to historic lows. In addition to the lives saved, the Department has also experienced significant increases in its clearance rates. At nearly 70%, our clearance rate is due in large part to the coordination between our patrol officers, skilled investigators and prosecutors, and also to increasing numbers of community members, victims, and witnesses who are standing up to criminals and working with us. We are also benefitting from the increasing skills of our technical and forensic experts and the modern tools and facilities that they have to work with in our state of the art crime lab.

For six years, I have had the privilege of telling your success stories and proving, through your hard work

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and dedication, that the Los Angeles Police Department is second to none. We have made great strides and continue to have significant success, but our work is never done. We need to use our success as the impetus to continue to work even harder and smarter to make our City even safer, increase the reputation of the Department, and fulfill what I hope are the dreams and motivations of each of you to have lives of significance. You count – you matter; and your crime reduction successes are the proof.

NOVEMBER - 2008

The 21st Century LAPD

The Thanksgiving month of November ushers in a season of remembrance, reflection and thanks. As the year nears its end, it is a time of reflection as we look back at how far we as a department have come. Our most important goal and mission is the reduction of crime, fear and disorder in our city. The downward trends of the last six years that continued in 2008 are something you all need to be very proud of.

In spite of a weakening economy, higher unemployment and poverty rates, and traditional negative influences on crime rates, you have reduced Violent Crime by 49% over the last six years, Total Part I crimes by 34%, and Gang Crime by 26%, including a 56% decrease in gang homicides. This is a phenomenal achievement and a major reason why Mayor Villaraigosa has committed to supporting public safety and the growth of the Department as the number one priority of his administration.

In our efforts to keep the City safe for tourists, we are second to none. We are developing an international reputation for our creativity and efforts in this vital area. As to the Consent Decree, we expect in May 2009 to successfully exit from all but a few of its monitoring requirements. Our fourth goal of the expansion of the Department by 1,000 officers is progressing on schedule and will allow for the opening of our 20th and 21st Area Stations in January 2009.

Keeping you safe as you do your job is one of my top priorities. Essential to your security and ability to police effectively and efficiently are the most current and up-to-date tools. Starting in 2008, the Department has finally begun to move forward into the 21st century in its technological advances and upgrading of our outdated equipment with the purchase of over 10,000 mobile hand-held radios, digital in-car camera systems and new, smaller, lighter TASER devices. Over 800 hand-held radios have already been purchased and nearly all have been distributed to Northeast and 77th Street Areas for assignment to each officer while they are stationed at those locations. Funding has been secured for the remaining 9,300 radios which will be purchased in the next year and a half. The Department is also on track with its implementation of the digital in-car camera systems. Installation of the systems in 300 South Bureau vehicles will be completed by the end of this year. We will phase 900 more in over the next several years. In addition, the Department is in the process of

ordering over 1,200 new replacement TASER's to upgrade the existing units currently in use. In upcoming fiscal years, we will start to purchase additional TASER's so that all patrol officers have individually assigned devices.

Also vital to peak performance is the Department's pledge to uphold its core value of quality through continuous improvement. As I vowed when I became your Chief in 2002, we would continually seek to streamline and improve the Department's onerous discipline system. Recently, the Board of Police Commissioners joined me in this ongoing initiative with their approval of the new Categorical Use of Force Adjudication Policy. Punitive action is no longer the first or only answer. The Department has developed a more strategic and effective response which aims to seek the best means of preventing recurrence. All officers involved in a Categorical Use of Force incident will be required to participate in a tactical debrief to identify both strong and weak points of an incident, creating an environment of continual learning where the focus is on performance improvement not punishment. With their approval, the Commission has shown it trusts the Department's leaders and you, the officers. I anticipate that this system with its emphasis on training and tactical improvements rather than its previous perceived emphasis on fault finding and discipline will go a long way in improving your receptiveness to the learning and training aspects of the system.

The upcoming year also holds great prospects for the Department and communities it serves. In 2009, the Department will complete \$1 billion in new construction and renovation of its police facilities. Along with the recent grand openings of the West Valley Area Replacement Station, Metro and Valley Bomb Squad facilities, Operations-Valley Bureau Headquarters/Valley Traffic Division, and the Rampart Area Replacement Station, the LAPD will be opening its new Olympic and Topanga Stations in January followed by the Harbor and Hollenbeck Area Replacement Stations in February and March. The first half of the year will end with the opening of the new Metro Detention Center and Property Division and the City's Emergency Operations Center which will house the LAPD Department Operations Center.

Most anticipated is the completion of the new Police Administration Building which is scheduled to be completed by November 2009. Fifty years ago, when Parker Center was opened, it was the most technologically advanced police facility in the nation. The new Police Administration Building is the most expensive and modern police headquarters ever built in this country and will be an appropriate symbol of the 21st Century LAPD. The new building features 500,000 square feet of office space, including conference rooms, Compstat Center, lunch rooms, 1,200 lockers, a fitness center, auditorium, Police Commission offices, and 1,100 parking spaces divided between the building and the new Motor Transport Division/Main Street

Parking Structure. Thanks to the generosity of the Los Angeles Police Foundation, included as part of the construction of the new Police Administration Building, is the design and creation of a new police memorial in honor of LAPD officers who have fallen in the line of duty. Construction of a multi-million dollar new memorial, also funded by the Police Foundation, will be an integral part of a contemplated 40 million dollar renovation of our historic home, the Police Academy at Elysian Park. It is only fitting that as we begin the 21st Century and celebrate the 140th Anniversary of the Department in 2009, that our historic home where we all so proudly began our LAPD careers also be the hallowed ground where we honor the over 200 men and women who gave their lives fulfilling the commitment with their last dying breath to protect and to serve.

2009 will be filled with a yearlong series of events department wide, celebrating our 140th year in the bright, promising future that lies ahead for us as we move into the 21st Century and once again claim, without fear of contradiction, our place as one of America's, if not the world's, truly great police organizations, looked to for guidance in leadership and

admiration for our commitment to integrity, professional-ism, morale and community policing. A department that we can all feel proud to be a part of – a department and personnel, civilian and sworn, second to none.

This Thanksgiving, the Department truly has much to be grateful for and much to look forward to. But in giving

RECENT ACTIONS BY THE POLICE COMMISSION

AUGUST 12: Accepted the Devonshire Area Community Police Advisory Board status report from Co-Chairs Sean Kane and Mr. Larry Stearn.

AUGUST 19: Reviewed and accepted an extensive report on racial profiling in Los Angeles. This report led to numerous recommendations including the changing of the term "racial profiling," to "biased policing."

SEPTEMBER 16: Reviewed and accepted a status report outlining the DNA processing backlog. This item is now being regularly reviewed by the Commission.

Accepted the final status of the personnel complaints arising from the May 1, 2007, MacArthur Park incident. Twenty-nine officers were charged with one or more allegations, for a combined total of 80 allegations. The Chief of Police sustained 31 allegations against 15 officers.

SEPTEMBER 23: Accepted the Mission Area Community Police Advisory Board status report from Co-Chairs Jorge Villegas and Ms. Melanie McShane.

SEPTEMBER 23: Approved the Audit Recommendation Status Report, First Quarter, 2008/2009, which reflected that Consent Decree items continue to be implemented and completed.

SEPTEMBER 29: Approved the Request for Proposals for the Valley Bureau Wireless Camera Surveillance System.

OCTOBER 7: Accepted a review of the disciplinary process. The new process stresses strategy before penalty, however that should not be interpreted as diminished or lighter in any way. Quarterly Discipline Reports should soon reflect some qualitative changes from this process.

Accepted a status report on the Autism Awareness Training. Approximately 700 personnel have received the live roll call training and 8,000 have received the training through E-Learning.

Held Community Meeting at Southwestern Law School. This meeting marked the most well-attended Police Commission meeting in the community.

Accepted a complete review of the status of the Hunter-La Ley Consent Decree. While the Department is making progress in terms of promoting minority and female officers, the promotions do not exactly mirror the population of the city of Los Angeles. The possibility of making the Hunter-La Ley statistics part of the COMPSTAT process is being considered. □

Got a Tip?

Reporting a tip has never been easier. In the hopes of receiving the public's assistance with three major homicide cases, Chief William J. Bratton was joined by Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa and Sheriff Lee Baca on September 18, 2008, to announce the Los Angeles Police Department's implementation of a brand new anonymous crime tip reporting system. Tipsters are now able to submit their tips anonymously via cell phone text message or through the Department's website.

Text-A-Tip Service allows tipsters to provide information to the LAPD and remain completely anonymous through text or Short Message Service messaging. Tipsters type the word "LAPD" plus their crime information on their cell phone or PDA to the number 2-7-4-6-3-7 which spells out the word "CRIMES". The text message is encrypted and an alias is generated for the tipster, masking their identity from the police. There is no way for the police to determine the user's identity.

TIPSOFT WEB TIPS is an anonymous method of receiving tips via e-mail. A tipster using any computer in the world can log in to provide information. Because the tipster and the police can communicate only through an "anonymizer," the tipster need not ever be known to the police. The tipster can log back in and provide additional information, such as answering follow-up questions posted for them by the police.

Users go to www.lapdonline.org and follow the link for "Anonymous Web Tips" where they can fill in a form. Once completed, they can elect to create a password and click on the Submit Tip button. A tip code is created after a tip is submitted. Tipsters can check the status of their tip at a later date by logging in with their code and password. The Two-Way Dialogue features allow the tipster to return at their convenience and securely provide additional information to their original tip and investigators can securely ask questions or provide instructions back to the tipster as well.

"Both of these systems will go directly to LAPD's regional crime center, which is manned 24 hours a day, seven days a week. An officer or detective there will receive that information and either do a follow-up on it or route it to the investigative entity that will be responsible for the investigation of

that crime," said Capt. Joel Justice.

Previously, there was no system whereby information could be passed from the public to the police and back without the identity of the person providing information being known to the police. Ultimately, many valuable tips were withheld from police because people lacked confidence their identity would be kept anonymous. Anonymous letters did not have a mechanism to ask simple follow-up questions, or eliminate hoaxes. These new services offered by the LAPD overcome all of these concerns. The LAPD is hopeful that these two new anonymous tip systems will open the flow of information between a community fearful of gangs and the police. □

SOCAL SHAKEOUT DRILL

Over 5.2 million Southern Californians dropped, covered and held on during the massive SoCal Shakeout Drill held across the Golden State the morning of

November 13, 2008. The exercise which simulated a 7.8 magnitude earthquake along the San Andreas Fault in Southern California tested the response and communication systems



of over 5,000 first responders from more than 100 federal, state and local agencies.

Participants throughout the counties of Los Angeles, Orange, San Diego, Riverside, Imperial, San Bernardino, and

their cities, took part in safety and evacuation drills, including simulated fire/rescue scenarios. Students at Bishop Alemany High School in Mission Hills reenacted a major collapse of the high school, resulting in more than 400 victims and several fatalities. The Los Angeles Fire Department and Holy Cross Hospital deployed personnel in a mock rescue demonstration and set up several practice medical triages.

Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger attended the drill and was very impressed with the response. "We have some of the best emergency responders in the world," he said. Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa echoed his sentiments, "This collaboration represents government at its best."

U.S. Geological Survey Chief Scientist Lucy Jones reminded everyone that we are all in this together and urged residents from across the state to "take at least one more step this weekend to be a little more prepared."

Californians are reminded "practice makes perfect" and exercises such as the Shakeout Drill are an important tool in assessing strengths and weaknesses and allows us the opportunity to improve in the future. In the case of a real life catastrophe, families should be prepared to care for themselves for up to 72 hours after disaster strikes. Take the time to make an emergency plan and exercise it. Buy, store and rotate emergency supplies like water, canned food and batteries. 115TH ANNUAL INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF CHIEFS OF POLICE


Police chiefs and law enforcement officials from around the world gathered in San Diego, California the week of November 8-12, 2008, for the 115th Annual International Association of Chiefs of Police Conference. The historic event which drew more than 15,000 participants included seminars, forums and technical workshops focusing on solutions for the new world of policing. Featured speakers included Attorney General Michael Mukasey, Federal Bureau of Investigation Director Robert Mueller, Director General of the French National Police Frederic Pechenard, and Homeland Security Secretary Michael Chertoff.

Attendees were also treated to exhibits, vendor demonstrations, and more than 185 workshops covering a variety of topics from homeland security to identity crime, including a presentation by LAPD Public Information Director Mary Grady titled 'Managing Your Message in Multiple

Languages – Bridging the Communication Gap with the Hispanic and Asian and Pacific Islander Communities.'

LAPD's Counter Terrorism and Criminal Intelligence Bureau and Detective Lillie Franklin were recognized by the International Association of Chiefs of Police and Parade Magazine. International Association of Chiefs of Police Excellence in Technology Award Winners – LAPD’s Los Angeles Regional Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force

The Department’s Los Angeles Regional Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force was recognized with the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) Excellence in Technology Award Program for its response to computer related crimes.

IACP awarded the Task Force for their superior achievement and innovation in the field of communication and information technology. This program is an international competition that was open to local, tribal, state, provincial, federal, and multi-jurisdictional law enforcement agencies.

The award presentation occurred at the 115th IACP Annual Conference and Exposition in San Diego that was attended by more than 15,000 law enforcement professionals from around the world. The conference features renowned keynote speakers, forums and technical workshops, and has a large exhibit of products and services for the law enforcement community.

The Task Force began in 2003 with funding from the United States Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile

Justice and Delinquency Prevention. It is also receives funding from the State of California, Office of Emergency Services. It conducts proactive and reactive investigations into computer and/or technology crimes perpetrated against children or by suspects throughout the City.

The Task Force emphasizes the technological education of investigators creating highly skilled and resourceful investigators. The Task Force conducts its own forensic analysis of evidence which facilitates a timely prosecution. In addition to its enforcement efforts, the Task Force provides presentations educating the community about internet safety.

Since 2006, the Task Force has handled 55 cases involving travelers, 101 involving enticement, 1140 Cypertips from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children and 561 involving obscenity directed towards minors that involved the manufacturing, distribution, and possession of child pornography and crimes that sexually exploit children.

Founded in 1893, the IACP is the world’s oldest and largest association of law enforcement executives with more than 19,000 members in nearly 100 countries. □

LAPD Mounted Platoon Open House

On Saturday September 20, 2008, the Mounted Platoon, a part of the Department's elite Metropolitan Division, opened the barn doors to the Ahmanson Equestrian Facility for its annual open house. Families enjoyed the afternoon touring the two-acre facility as they got an up close look at the forty horse barn that includes American Quarter horses.

In the Arena, the Mounted Platoon gave an insiders' perspective as to how they train their horses and simulated field exercises in apprehending suspects. The K9 Unit was also on hand to demonstrate how they assist in searching and finding suspects, as well as SWAT officers who reenacted a hostage rescue.

Visitors were treated to static displays from the SWAT Team, Bomb Squad, Fire Department, and Department's Historical Museum. Children enjoyed petting the horses, rock climbing, and had their identification photo and fingerprints taken.

The Mounted Platoon was established in 1987 as a component of the Metropolitan Division and is currently composed of 35 full-time sworn police personnel, including 1 Lieutenant, 4 Sergeants and 30 Police Officers. Each Mounted Platoon officer is required to complete a 200-hour equestrian training program prior to being assigned to field duty. The comprehensive course covers basic and advanced equitation skills, tactics, equine physiology and psychology.

As part of their crowd management duties, the Department's Mounted Platoon can be seen at public demonstrations working with foot patrol officers in controlling large groups of protestors. Their presence provides visible security and a sense of assurance at large festivals and parades. Mounted Platoon also has an active role in high-profile crime suppression in targeted crime areas throughout the City. Additional Mounted Platoon duties include public park enforcement, public beach enforcement during the summer months, and search and rescue of lost or missing persons in mountainous and dense terrain areas of the City. □

This campaign aims to educate people it is illegal to celebrate the New Year by shooting a gun into the air. Discharging a firearm into the air is a felony punishable by one year in state prison. Anyone arrested for discharging a firearm will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law.

The New Years Eve Gunfire Reduction Campaign consisted of media interviews and a print, radio, online and outdoor advertising campaign. The creative artwork was created by Robert Sallin, an LAPD Reserve officer and advertising and marketing veteran of more than 30 years.

The artwork features four individual pictures of smiling children on a white background with the words, "Love them don't shoot them. Please don't fire your gun into the air this New Years." Los Angeles Lakers Guard Kobe Bryant lent



his support to this campaign by recording a public service announcement reminding people that a bullet shot from a gun will come down and can kill an innocent person.

A news conference showcased the Shot Spotter technology, a gunshot location system that provides wide-area acoustic surveillance that detects and pinpoints gunfire within seconds.

The LAPD's Gun Fire Reduction committee is organized by Lt. Jorge Rodriguez, Operations Special Bureau, who also coordinated the Anti-Fireworks efforts for the 4th of July. □
