

# **CRIME AND ARREST INFORMATION**

Officers in Southwest Division have been working extremely hard to reduce crime, provide a safe environment and a better quality of life for the residents and business owners of the Southwest Area.

## **3SLO1-ADAMS BOULEVARD NEIGHBORHOOD**

### **Crime Trends**

Senior Lead Officer (SLO) Sanchez is happy to report that the Adams Boulevard Neighborhood had a considerably low number of reported crimes and there were no crime clusters (5 or more crimes in one reporting district). Although this is great news, SLO Sanchez reminds community members to continue to remain alert and aware of your surroundings. Also remember to lock your doors and windows when you leave for work.

### **Crime Tips-Vehicle Security**

You can prevent vehicle theft! Most cars are taken by amateurs who can be stopped fairly easily. You can increase your protection against this type of crime by taking the following sensible precautions:



### **Lock up**

An unlocked car is an open invitation to a car thief. Lock up when you leave your car, and take the keys with you.


Lock the trunk or tailgate.

*Close all windows — professional thieves have tools that unlock cars through the smallest openings.*

*Be sure vent or wind-wing windows are shut tight.*

*When you park the car, remove cellular phones, cassette players and other valuable possessions. Do not leave gift-wrapped packages or cameras lying on the seat. Lock all valuables in your trunk or take them with you.*

*Lock your car even if you are making a quick stop at the gas station, convenience store or mini-mall.*



### **Use Anti-Theft Devices**

*When buying a car, check the manufacturer's list of anti-theft options, such as interior hood and trunk releases, locking steering columns and others.*

*Consider the purchase and installation of security devices, such as:*

*Second ignition switch or "kill switch" to prevent electrical current from reaching the coil distributor.*

*Fuel switch to prevent fuel from reaching the carburetor.*

*Locking gas cap.*

*Interior hood lock release.*

### 3SLO15-WEST ADAMS NEIGHBORHOOD

#### Crime Trends

Southwest officers were very busy in the West Adams Neighborhood during the month of January. Senior Lead Officer Hauter reports that the Southwest Gang Unit recovered a gun and narcotics, which resulted in the arrest of five gang members. This is certainly a step in the right direction to make this community a safer place for everyone to work and live.



Also, last month on January 19<sup>th</sup>, SLO Hauter responded to Hobart Alley with the Department of Sanitation. Thanks to the help of her fellow Senior Lead Officers, they were able to clean and clear the alley of pungent rubbish. The Los Angeles Fire Department (LAFD) also responded out to scene and completed a “wash down,” to help with the odor.

Unfortunately, the Adams-Normandie area has been experiencing a high volume of Burglary From Motor Vehicles (BFMV). Please make sure to lock your vehicles and do not leave your personal belongings exposed to potential suspects. In the meantime, Southwest Senior Lead Officers will be conducting a Task Force to try to combat this problem.

### 3SLO19-NORTH UNIVERSITY PARK

#### Crime Trends

Last month, the North University Park area experienced an increase in Burglary From Motor Vehicles. Senior Lead Officer Salazar reports these crimes are occurring primarily along Adams Boulevard from Vermont Avenue to Scarff Street.

In response, Southwest Division along with the University Of California Department Of Public Safety conducted a crime suppression detail and handed out crime prevention flyers in the affected areas. Although no specific arrests were made, officers were able to obtain helpful information regarding these crimes.



### 3A31-JEFFERSON PARK

#### Crime Trends

In the new year Senior Lead Officer Biondo wants the Jefferson Park community to know that he has strengthened partnerships with the Department of Building & Safety, The Bureau of Street Services and the Los Angeles County Department of Health. If you observe violations involving single family homes, including but not limited to yard debris, unapproved use or illegal improvements, contact Building & Safety directly. For issues involving sidewalk sales (of non-food items) and yard sales, contact Bureau of Street Services via 3-1-1. Finally, if you observe illegal food vending or have gotten sick after eating from a specific vendor, please call the Los Angeles County Department of Health for assistance. SLO Biondo requests that you also inform him of the issues you observe so he can work to abate these problems and continually improve the quality of life in the Southwest Area.

If you see graffiti or bulky items discarded, especially in alleys, contact 3-1-1 for removal. You'll be given a reference number. Keep this number handy in case if the request is not completed in a timely manner, so you can forward the location and

reference number to SLO Biondo and he can follow-up with the appropriate City department.

### **Crime Tips-Illegal Dumping**

Illegal dumping is a crime that has become a chronic problem within some parts of the City of Los Angeles. In addition to increasing community fear and apathy, illegal dumping can be a breeding ground for disease carrying insects and vermin.

Illegal dumping is a violation of California Penal Code section 374.3 which prohibits non-commercial and commercial dumping of waste material, on public and private highways or roads.

### ***Tips for the General Public***

*Obey posted "No Dumping" signs.*

*Recycle items you legally must, such as car batteries and motor oil, at certified recycling centers.*



*Recycle items you can such as scrap metal, cardboard, newspaper, glass, aluminum, tin, and water-based paints.*

*If recycling household hazardous waste, contact the City of Los Angeles, Department of Public Waste, Household Hazardous Waste Hotline, at (800) 552-2128.*

*When cleaning work sites it is best to sweep them rather than hosing them down.*

*Use nontoxic cleaning products and include safety equipment and cleanup materials appropriate to the type of materials involved.*

*Take household chemicals and toxic materials to a local Household Hazardous Waste Roundup instead of dumping them on the ground, down the sink, into a gutter, street or storm drain. To find out when a roundup is going to occur in your community, call the Los Angeles Bureau of Sanitation at (800) 98-TOXIC.*

*Wash vehicles with biodegradable, phosphate free detergents.*

*Prevent oil, grease and other toxic material from spilling into storm drains.*

*Reuse leftover paint for touch-ups or recycle it at a local hazardous waste collection event.*

*Never clean paintbrushes or rinse paint containers into a street or gutter.*

*Use organic or nontoxic fertilizers and pesticides.*

*Place pruning waste in approved containers for pick up.*

*Keep a trash bag in the car and use it. Don't throw anything out of the window.*

*Dispose of pet waste in trashcans.*

*Do not sweep compost yard trimmings into the street.*

## **3SLO41-BALDWIN HILLS VISTA/ VILLAGE GREEN**

### **Crime Trends**

Senior Lead Officer Beard reports that Residential Burglaries are still a prevailing crime in the Baldwin Hills Vista/Village Green area. Being aware of activities that take place in your community is a good way for residents to determine if something is not normal or out of place. If something does not “seem right” in terms of possible criminal activity, do not hesitate to call the police.

SLO Beard also reports that this area has experienced an increase in illegal dumping activity. Should you observe trash or debris in the area, please contact 311 to report it.

### **Crime Tips-Prevention for Vandalism**

***You can help prevent vandalism by following the below listed tips:***

*Educate the public, especially young people about the costs of vandalism.*

*Clean up vandalism as soon as it happens -- replace signs, repair playground equipment, paint over graffiti.*

*If you see anyone committing vandalism, report it to the police, school authorities, or someone who can take action.*

*Remember, vandalism is a crime.*



*Protect your house or apartment from vandalism by using good lighting and locking gates and garages.*

Support recreational programs for young people in your community. Volunteer your time, donate money or supplies, and help in any way you can.

### ***Take a Stand!***

Tap into the energy and idealism of youth. Involve young people in all vandalism prevention efforts.

Organize a graffiti clean-up project in your neighborhood.

Work with Neighborhood Watch and ask the City or a local business for cleaning supplies and paint.

Work with schools or the arts community to paint murals on areas that are vulnerable to graffiti. Make it a contest for teens.

### **3SLO55-JEFFERSON PARK/WESTERN CORRIDOR**

#### **Crime Trends**

Last month the Jefferson Park/Western Corridor experienced an increase in Burglaries that occurred during daylight hours. Senior Lead Officer Olega received reports of very young juveniles that have been observed prowling around private properties. Residents are encouraged to develop good relationships with neighbors, look out for one another, and report any suspicious activity to the police.

### 3SLO63-BALDWIN VILLAGE

#### Crime Trends

Senior Lead Officer Thomsen would like to thank the community for the information they provided regarding suspects that were involved in stealing vehicles in the Baldwin Village community. As a result of this information, Southwest footbeat officers arrested a Grand Theft Auto (GTA) suspect. This arrest led to several reports being cleared in the area. Thank you to all the community members in Baldwin

Village for their continued support. It's the perfect example of what can happen when the efforts of all community stakeholders come together for the common goal for all.



#### Crime Tips-Fire Safety Awareness

Fires can be furious and deadly. Each year, more than 600 children ages 14 and under die, and nearly 47,000 are injured, in fires. Despite a dramatic 56 percent decline in the fire death rate since 1988, fires remain a leading cause of unintentional injury-related death among children in Australia. But there are time-tested ways to prevent fire-related injuries.



Simply installing smoke alarms on every level of your home and in every sleeping area, for instance, cuts the chances of dying in a home fire in half. Keeping matches, lighters and other heat sources out of children's reach can help eliminate child-play fires – the leading cause of fire-related death for children 5 and under.

#### **Protecting Your Family**

A small fire can grow into a deadly one within minutes. To help prevent a tragedy, closely inspect your home to eliminate potential hazards. Prepare your home for an emergency, and teach your family

about the dangers of fire and how to escape. If a child is coached properly ahead of time, he or she will have a better chance of surviving.



### 3SLO73-LEIMERT PARK/ CRENSHAW CORRIDOR

#### Crime Trends

A couple weeks ago, Senior Lead Officer Sasajima sent out a notice regarding burglaries that the community experienced during the holidays. Shortly after that notice was distributed, SLO Sasajima received information from a resident who observed a suspicious person hanging around in what appeared to be a black and white police vehicle. On

January 19, 2011, Southwest Senior Lead Officers arrested a suspect driving a black Ford Crown Victoria with a white roof (an old police car that was sold at auction) for burglary. They were able to recover property belonging to about three households along Garthwaite Avenue. The District Attorney's office filed four counts of Burglary against the suspect who was already on parole.



Furthermore, Southwest Burglary Detectives believe this suspect may also be involved with other recent burglaries in the Leimert Park area. While this big arrest is good news, it is a temporary fix in combating

the burglaries that plague the neighborhood. SLO Sasajima encourages the community to continue to keep an eye out for suspicious activity. He will look into any and all information given to him and will try to keep everyone posted on any relative information as he receives it.

#### Crime Tips-Raves and Club Drugs

##### What Are Raves?

"Raves" are high energy, all-night dances that feature hard pounding techno-music and flashing laser lights. Raves are found in most metropolitan areas and, increasingly, in rural areas throughout the country. The parties are held in permanent dance clubs, abandoned warehouses, open fields, or empty buildings.

Raves are frequently advertised as "alcohol free" parties with hired security personnel. Internet sites often advertise these events as "safe" and "drug free." However, they are dangerously over crowded parties where your child can be exposed to rampant drug use and a high-crime environment. Numerous overdoses are documented at these events.

Raves are one of the most popular venues where club drugs are distributed. Club drugs include MDMA (more commonly known as "Ecstasy"), GHB and Rohypnol (also known as the "date rape" drug), Ketamine, Methamphetamine (also known as "Meth"), and LSD.



Because some club drugs are colorless, odorless, and tasteless, they can be added without detection to beverages by individuals who want to intoxicate or sedate others in order to commit sexual assaults.

Rave promoters also capitalize on the effects of club drugs. Bottled water and sports drinks are sold at Raves, often at inflated prices, to manage hyperthermia and dehydration. Also common at a Rave are pacifiers to prevent involuntary teeth clenching, menthol nasal inhalers, surgical masks, chemical lights, and neon glow sticks to increase sensory perception and enhance the Rave experience. Cool down rooms are provided, usually at a cost, as a place to cool off due to increased body temperature of the drug user.

The bottom line is: Don't risk your child's health and safety. Ask questions about where he or she is going and see it for yourself.

### 3SLO99-VERMONT SQUARE

#### *Crime Trends*

Senior Lead Officer Anderson received reports of robberies occurring around the area of Manual Arts High School. Students have been robbed of their i-Pods while walking in the vicinity of school grounds.

Parents and teachers should remind their kids not to carry their i-Pods in plain view or better yet to leave them at home. The administration at Manual Arts is expected to issue a letter to parents to encourage them to advise their children to take safety precautions while walking to and from school.
