The Medal of Valor and Purple Heart ceremony recognized real-life events that exemplify exceptional stories of bravery and heroism as narrated by one of Hollywood's veteran actors, Eric Dane.

During the awards presentation, audience members heard about officers facing harrowing, deadly circumstances in the line of duty as they protect and serve. These larger-than-life encounters include:

- The tragic death of Officer Nicolas Lee who was killed instantly when a massive, runaway construction truck careened into his police vehicle. After extensive and frantic work to access the passenger compartment, rescuers were forced to cut off the top of the police vehicle to gain access to Officer Lee and his partner.
- A surprise attack on two officers working the front desk at LAPD's West Traffic Division lobby. A man entered the lobby and said he had a complaint as he produced a handgun and began firing at the officers. One of the officers was severely wounded, yet endured an intense close quarters gunfight with the suspect, eventually striking him until he collapsed.
- The incredible story of an officer standing by the driver's side door of his police vehicle when a drunk driver in a minivan rammed into him with such force that his car doors opened in the opposite direction, pinning him between the minivan and the police car. Though he was in a coma for five days, hospitalized for two months and told he would never return to police work, he miraculously returned to full duty within seven months.

- The heartbreaking death of Motor Officer Christopher Cortijo who was rear-ended on his motorcycle with great force, by a driver under the influence of narcotics. The officer was a 26-year Department veteran and DUI taskforce member who, during the course of his career, arrested more than 3,000 violators for driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs.
- The bizarre story of a man, who jumped out of a moving ambulance, then assaulted a paramedic and ran into a church where an officer played a deadly game of hide-and-seek in efforts to apprehend the suspect. When he finally came face-to-face with the suspect, the man brutally stabbed the officer, causing him to go into shock with profuse bleeding before his partner finally shot the suspect and stopped the attack.
- The appalling murder of Officer Roberto Sanchez at the wheel of a police car trying to stop a speeding car. During his efforts to stop the car, a second vehicle associated with the speeding car joined the fray and intentionally crashed into the police vehicle at a tremendous speed, literally causing “catastrophic” damage to the driver's side of the police car.

When you look back on the history of the LAPD, you will find countless examples of bravery and selflessness from those who have served our communities and continue to do so. As a Department, it is important to me that we recognize and acknowledge our personnel for those heroic acts that are above and beyond the call of duty. On Thursday October 1, 2015, on behalf of the Department, I will proudly bestow the highest law enforcement decoration upon 23 LAPD officers at the "Above and Beyond Medal of Valor and Purple Heart Awards Ceremony." The ceremony will be held at

The Ray Dolby Ballroom on the fifth level of Hollywood & Highland Center at 11:30 a.m.

This year we recognize eight LAPD officers with the Medal of Valor for extraordinary acts of heroism. Seventeen LAPD officers will be presented with the Purple Heart. Two officers, Officer Alberto Ortiz, Metropolitan Division, and Officer Allan Krish, Wilshire Division, will receive both the Medal of Valor and the Purple Heart.

Four police officers: Policeman Charles 'Rick' Hollenbeck, 77th Division; Officer Roberto Sanchez, Harbor Division; Officer Nicholas Lee, Hollywood Division; and, Officer Christopher Cortijo, Valley Traffic Division, will be presented the Purple Heart posthumously. Their sacrifices and the bravery they demonstrated continue to live on in each of you every day you go out and serve our communities.

I want to thank The Los Angeles Police Foundation and Verizon for hosting and presenting this ceremony that al-

lows us to showcase the great sacrifice and heroism displayed by those wearing the badge.

LAPD Supports and Salutes Our Veterans

The LAPD continues its proud history of supporting the men and women who have answered the nation's call to service. You are true patriots who we owe a profound amount of gratitude to. The Department recognizes the sacrifices made by veterans and your families.

The Department employs 2,274 sworn and 184 civilian personnel who have served in the Armed Forces and have worked to support peace and freedom around the world. Of our veterans, 272 currently serve in the Guard or Reserve. At

any given time, the Department has at least 10 or 20 service members conducting Annual Training or attending military related schooling. Currently, the Department has five members on long term military leave in support of a contingency operation both here and abroad.

On Tuesday November 10, 2015, at 10:00 a.m, I invite you to attend our annual Marine Corps Birthday Celebration and Veteran's Day Commemoration held at Deaton Hall. We will recognize the contributions of our service men and women who wear two uniforms and risk their life in the City and abroad to keep us safe. They are deserving of our constant gratitude and support. Keep them and their families in your thoughts and prayers as we enter the holiday season.

Upcoming Training Courses

Staying informed and well-trained is essential to each of our functions within the Department. I wanted to take a moment and tell everyone about the upcoming Use of

Force (UOF) update training that every officer will be required to attend. I also want to talk about our new Police Science Leadership (PSL) Course "Building the Community Leader" that will be given to officers just prior to the end of their probationary period.

The UOF Update training day consists of two-sessions. The first session is a review of the National Discussion on Building Public Trust and Preservation of Life. The remainder of the training will consist of constitutional law, UOF policy, UOF de-escalation, command and control, force-on-force scenarios and a review of less-lethal force options. During the training, less-lethal deployment stations will be set up to allow officers to fire all Department approved less-lethal devices (bean-bag shotgun, TASER, OC Spray, etc.) to develop their skill sets in handling these weapons. Overall, it should be an exciting training day that will test the abilities of all of our officers in handling difficult UOF scenarios. By now, everyone should have attended the National Discussion on Building Public Trust and

Preservation of Life. The training focused on how we can continue to build trust which in turn will allow us to be more effective in the communities we serve. It also covered the importance of Constitutional Policing, Use of Force overview, and reducing the potential for violence during police contacts involving people suffering from mental illness.

The Department is the first law enforcement agency in the State to gain California Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) approval to use stress vest technology in perishable skills training. Officers will be fitted with the stress vest technology and be required to handle real-life scenarios with Training Division instructors acting as suspects.

I am also very excited about the development and implementation (November 2015) of our new PSL I Course "Building the Community Leader."

For many years, our training managers wanted to create a course for probationary officers that graduated from the Academy and now had some real-life practical experience in the field. This would be an opportune time to bring them back to the Academy as a class and expose them to advanced leadership skills, investigative skills, command and control, and innovative topics such as Fair and Impartial Policing and Procedural Justice. These probationary officers will also attend the critically acclaimed "Mental Health Intervention Training" created in partnership between our Mental Evaluation Unit and the County of Los Angeles Department of Mental Health.

These are exciting times as the Department is about to roll out some extremely important training. I hope that the tremendous investment in developing these courses has a positive outcome and that all of you enjoy the training and gain the skills needed to be successful in these critical encounters.

- Employee Relations Group (ERG) is working to increase employee satisfaction, confidence, and trust by developing a survey to obtain employee insight. ERG will also distribute a newsletter for “best practices” accessible to all Department employees.
- Strategic Planning Group is developing a Community Survey to be rolled out January 2016. The survey will measure fear of crime, community confidence in police response, trust in police, and satisfaction in levels of service quality.
- MEU (Mental Evaluation Unit) is in the process of expanding staffing levels to include three additional sergeants and nine officers. MEU is awaiting the hiring of 16 clinicians from the Department of Mental Health before the new SMART Teams can be formed. This will increase System-wide Mental Assessment Response Team (SMART) by nine, bringing the total to 17 SMART teams available on a 24-hour basis beginning early 2016. MEU will continue to staff the triage desk 24 hours, seven days a week.
- Operation LASER (Los Angeles’ Strategic Extraction and Restoration Program) analyzes data from an area to target violent repeat offenders and gang members who commit crimes in a geographic area. It is currently operating in Newton, 77th, Southwest and Southeast Areas. In 2016, Operation LASER will be expanded to an additional four Areas.
- Operations West Bureau is scheduled to roll out Digital In-Car Video in 2016.
- The Junior Cadet Program is currently active in 13 Area Commands and will be expanded to include Northeast and Foothill Areas by 2016.

Chief Beck meets with President Obama & Law Enforcement Leaders at White House to Discuss Criminal Justice Reform

On October 22, 2015, Chief Charlie Beck joined President Obama and Bill Keller, Editor-in-Chief of The Marshall Project, for a conversation on criminal justice reform with U.S. Attorney John Walsh from Colorado. The focus of the discussion was how to make America's law enforcement and correctional practices more just and effective.

Though L.A. has a painful history and still experiences difficult moments today, we have taken extraordinary steps to break from the past - and our achievements and commitment to continuing progress have earned our city a place among America's leaders in 21st century policing and criminal justice reform. That is affirmed by Chief Beck's conversation with President Obama at the White House, as they discussed ways that America's law enforcement and correctional practices can be made fairer and more effective.

Cities across the nation can find transformative lessons in L.A.'s story - as we deepen our police department's relationships with the communities we serve, emphasize de-escalation tactics and transparency through what will be the nation's largest body-camera program, and provide pathways to second chances for nonviolent offenders instead of pipelines to prison.

"We have to recognize that all crimes do not carry the same weight and some crimes involve addiction and mental illness and have other pathways that can be more effective than incarceration. We are a reflection of a much larger issue in America. There is racial disparity in housing, in employment, in the entire economic system. We have to look at these things in totality and address them as a nation," stated Chief Beck.

The Los Angeles Police Department has embraced the recommendations from the President's Task Force on 21st Century Policing Interim Report released earlier this year. A key pillar of the Interim Report pertains to developing policy and oversight with regard to Police Training and Education. This summer, Chief Beck unveiled a five-hour block of training to every field officer in the LAPD on the topic of reverence for life. The training utilized historical reference points including the 1992 Riots and the Rampart Corruption Scandal, as well as national use of force incidents to highlight key transformational moments in the department's history. The course included a block on building our capacity to engage the mentally ill. Officers walked away with the reminder that reverence for all life is the cornerstone to constitutional policing.

Chief Beck addressed a second pillar of the report - Community Policing and Crime Reduction - through



continued growth of the Cadet program, establishing an LAPD Headquarters Cadet Post in order to recognize the voice of youth in community decision-making. The Department is also spearheading a Juvenile Arrest Diversion Program in Operations-South Bureau designed to keep first time offenders from jail time through social engagement, education, and job training.


“One-Adam-12, a Tribute to Martin Milner”




Clear Channel Outdoor Donates Billboards to Promote Traffic Safety

Gerald "Blackie" Sawyer Memorial Highway Dedication Ceremony



Gerald "Blackie" Sawyer Memorial Highway

The Memorial Highway sign dedication ceremony for LAPD Investigator Gerald "Blackie" Sawyer has been scheduled for November 6th, 2015 at 10:00am. The ceremony will be held at Berhinger Park and Athletic Field in the City of La Mirada, CA (Address: 15900 Alicante Rd, La Mirada, CA 90638)

November 6th marks the 42nd year since Sawyer was shot and killed while working in a joint undercover investigation with the United States Drug Enforcement Administration. Detective Sawyer was shot by a cocaine trafficker during an attempted robbery of a \$144,000 flashroll.

Blackie's children, Brian, Christy, and the entire Sawyer family welcome your presence at this special highway naming event to honor the memory of their father Gerald "Blackie" Sawyer. Brian has asked that you please share the details of the event with anyone that may have known Blackie or been associated with him.

The ceremony to dedicate the Gerald "Blackie" Sawyer Memorial Highway was held in the city of La Mirada, on November 6, 2016.

The Memorial Highway sign dedicated to the memory of Detective Sawyer stands on State Route 39, also known as Beach Boulevard, between Hillsborough Road in La Mirada and Stage Road in Buena Park.

Detective Sawyer was born on November 19, 1941, in the City of Los Angeles. He began attending the Los Angeles Police Academy in 1963, where he attained his ultimate desire by becoming a proud member of the Los Angeles Police Department where he served for 10 years.

Detective Sawyer relocated to the City of La Mirada in 1971 where he resided with his wife and children. He was an active member of his community and began coaching the La Mirada Monarch, a Pop Warner youth football team, leading them to an undefeated championship season.

On November 6, 1973, Detective Gerald "Blackie" Sawyer, assigned to Narcotics Division, was working a joint taskforce with LAPD officers and the Drug Enforcement Administration to make an undercover narcotics purchase.

A police informant introduced Detective Sawyer as a prospective buyer to a known cocaine trafficker and arrangements were made for the purchase of 20 kilos of cocaine on the fifth floor hotel room of a Holiday Inn in the city of Santa Monica. Detective Sawyer, carrying a briefcase containing \$140,000 in cash, met with the suspect and the informant in a hotel room to conduct the narcotics transaction. Detective Sawyer handed the briefcase to the suspect who counted the money twice. Without warning, the suspect took out a .25 caliber pistol and shot Detective Sawyer multiple times.

LAPD officers and Drug Enforcement Administration agents in an adjacent room who were monitoring the narcotics transaction immediately rushed into the hotel room and took the suspect and informant into custody. Unfortunately, Detective Sawyer succumbed to his injuries.

In 1974, Detective Sawyer was posthumously awarded the LAPD Medal of Valor, and in 1992, the LAPD Training Division made a video to reenact the tragic events of his death. Detective Sawyer was the first Los Angeles Police Department undercover officer ever to be killed in the line of duty. In 2014, Detective Sawyer was posthumously awarded the LAPD Purple Heart for sacrificing his life in the service of law enforcement.

RECENT ACTIONS BY THE POLICE COMMISSION



October 6: The Probationary Police Officer Procedures Audit presented by Police Performance Auditor Jeffrey Phillips and Commander Jon Peters was approved with the understanding the Department will present a status report on the issue in 90 days. Commissioner Johnson expressed his concern as he noted the probationary period of an officer's career is critical and such was monitored by the Consent Decree. The Consent Decree required compliance rated be maintained at 95%, this audit reflected low compliance rates. All four Bureaus presented their action plans to improve compliance. All plans centered on a specific and audited checklist for the training and/or probation coordinator.

October 13: Police Commissioner Matthew Johnson stated he and his fellow Commissioners

are limited in what can be publicly discussed regarding use of force cases, he however expressed concern over four recent cases. He asked for an update on the status of training in the areas of public trust, constitutional policing, use of force and working with the mentally ill. Assistant Chief Earl Paysinger stated training in each of this areas is going very strong and this kind of training is a priority for the Department. Inspector Alex Bustamante will also be monitoring the training closely and will report back to the Commission with a status report.

Police Performance Auditor Jeff Phillips and Police Administrator John Neuman presented the Crime Classification Audit, which was approved. While the audit revealed generally good results, there were some areas of concern. Assistant Chief Michel Moore explained the Department is always trying to achieve 100% compliance in classifying crimes within Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) standards, however that goal cannot be achieved

with the current electronic equipment the Department uses. The newly-created Data Integrity Section is continually working on improving the compliance rate.

November 3: Chief Charlie Beck was honored to speak with President Obama in Washington D.C. regarding the future of policing in America. The conversation focused on the reduction of incarceration as well as the reduction of crime. He was pleased to announce the arrest of the "Western Bandit" who is linked to 23 robberies and two murders. Chief Beck commended the work of Metro officer's who confronted an armed gang member who shot at them, and they were able to apprehend him without using their guns.

November 17: Commissioner Sandra Figueroa-Villa expressed her support for Commission President Matthew Johnson vision and goals to capture the contemporary needs and challenges of law enforcement throughout the country and transform them into an action plan for Los

Angeles.

The Inspector General's report relative to the review of the Mental Evaluation Unit (MEU) was approved with the direction that the Department provide quarterly updates. Lieutenant Brian Bixler reported that MEU staff including clinicians from the County of Los Angeles will actually be doubled after the beginning of the year. Captain John Romero noted patrol officers are also receiving additional training in working effectively with the mentally ill.

The Department's report relative to body worn video deployment and implementation costs and personal services agreement with Taser International, Inc, for body worn video and conducted electrical weapons for the Los Angeles Police Department as presented by Chief Information Officer Maggie Goodrich was approved. The next phase of the body worn cameras will deliver 6,200 cameras by 2016. The contract was awarded to Taser International, Inc., through the City contract process.
