## LAPD ANNOUNCES HISTORIC PROMOTION AND MOVEMENT OF COMMAND STAFF Terry Hara First Asian American Deputy Chief

n Tuesday, January 22, 2008, Chief Bratton announced the promotion and reassignment of several members of the LAPD Command Staff, beginning in March.

"As several members of the current LAPD Command Staff announce their retirements, I will have the opportunity to promote many dedicated and qualified individuals to take their place," said Chief Bratton. "Along with the promotion will be changes in Command for other staff officers."

Promoting to Deputy Chief and being assigned to Commanding Officer West Bureau, is Commander Terry Hara. Commander Hara will become the first Asian American to achieve the rank of Deputy Chief in LAPD history. Commander Hara joined the LAPD in February

1980 after having been introduced to law enforcement as a Police Explorer Scout with the Long Beach Police Department. He has held numerous positions and worked various assignments in the Department, including his current post as the Department's Employee Relations Administrator for the Chief of Police.

Of the appointment, Commander Hara said, "I was elated and honored when Chief Bratton informed me about my promotion to Deputy Chief. This promotion is historic for the Department and the people of Los Angeles. I shall

tanding in front of the Watts Towers on January 2, 2008, Mayor Villaraigosa and I, along with members of the Command Staff, City leaders and community members, announced that preliminary crime statistics for 2007 show our Part I crime rate dropped for the sixth year in a row. Moreover, the per capita crime rate for Part I crime remained below the 1956 level for the third year in a row. And you, the men and women of the Los Angeles Police Department, made good on our Department goal of a 5% decrease in crime for the year 2007.

Homicides dropped 18%; rape decreased 13.8%; robbery went down by 6.2%; aggravated assaults dropped 9.3%; burglary dipped 4.1%; car burglary

dropped 0.2%; personal and other theft decreased 6.1. %; and auto theft went down 8.3%. Additionally, victims of shootings continued their decline in 2007, as they had in each of the previous five years. In 2006, 476 persons were murdered and 2,210 were shot. For 2007, these numbers came down to 84 fewer homicide victims and 315 fewer

shooting victims. Each of these represents a life saved and a family free from the tragic consequences of violentcrime.

For the year 2007, homicides fell to a 37-year low, with the final number at 392 total. Our homicide rate is the lowest it has been since 1970. This homicide

figure marks a huge reduction from 1992, the deadliest year in our history, when Los Angeles recorded its highest number of homicides ever in a single year, 1,092. In that year, the per capita homicide rate

reached 3.09 per 10,000 residents, whereas in 2007, we saw a rate of 0.93 per 10,000 residents.

What this means is that tremendous progress has been made to secure every Los Angeles neighborhood. LA is a much safer place to live, to work, and to visit. And these crime reduction figures didn't just happen. They are a direct result of your commitment and dedication. You achieved these successes with a ratio of about one officer for every 445 residents, less than half the rate of the New York City

Police Department. In December 2007, for the first time since 1999, our police officer ranks increased to over 9,600 as part of the 1,000-officer hiring plan initiated by Mayor Villaraigosa.

The principle reason for the declining crime figures is you and your hard work. Smart, efficient, focused policing that emphasizes partnership, problem solving

> and prevention- and is built on a strong foundation of optimism that we, the police, matter- is what's making the difference. It's not the economy, demographics, employment rates, gentrification, or the weather that are causing the crime rates to decline.

They are influences, not causes. I have spent my professional career driving home this point to the naysayers and the skeptics, and anybody else who refuses to give credit where credit is due. For the last 6 years with your successes and driving crime down against great odds, you have given me a great story to tell about the importance of police in our democracy. The primary responsibility of a democratic government is public safety. Your hard work is ensuring that obligation continues to be increasingly fulfilled here in Los Angeles. You are becoming a model to the rest of the world for being second to none in fulfilling the promise "to protect and to serve." You should all feel quite proud to be members of this great Department and the police profession. The LAPD is making a difference because we are the difference.

Deputy Chief Kenny Garner will become Commanding Officer of South

Bureau. Appointed to the Los Angeles Police **Department** in June 1977, Chief Garner has over twenty years of supervisory experience and spent many years as a police officer in assignments in South **Bureau including** Southwest Area, 77th Street Area and Southeast Area. As a Captain, Garner was Commanding Officer of 77th Street Area.

Chief Garner, in response to the news, stated, "I'm very excited to be returning to Operations-South Bureau where I've worked thirteen different assignments in the past. I

look forward to continuing the great work done by Deputy Chief Charlie Beck and continue to find ways to reduce crime and embrace the various communities within the Bureau."

Deputy Chief Charlie Beck will become the new Chief of Detectives, taking over for Deputy Chief Gary Brennan, who is retiring. A 31-year Department veteran, Chief Beck will have line command of the Detective Bureau and functional responsibilities for detective operations Citywide, and

will be a direct report to Chief Bratton.

"Detectives in general, and Detective Bureau specifically, need to take an increased role of leadership within the Department. Separating Detective Bureau from the Office of Operations and adding the COMPSTAT and RACR functions will enable us to not only elevate the status of Detectives within our organization but also to increase their impact on crime reduction and strategies. ### New Bomb Squad Facility Dedicated In The Valley

n Thursday, January 10, 2008, Chief Bratton and several dignitaries gathered for a ribbon cutting ceremony at the newly constructed Valley Bomb Squad Facility located at the Department's Edward Davis Training Facility in Granada Hills. One of the buildings that resulted from the \$600 million dollar Proposition Q public safety bond measure to improve, renovate, and expand police facilities, the Bomb Squad Facility was built on a 4.5 acre site and cost \$7 million dollars to complete. The new facility includes a 9,200 square foot main building, an outdoor training area, and an explosive detonation bunker for testing as well as parking for 226 vehicles. The main building will serve as both an operational and training facility.

In his remarks, Chief Bratton spoke of the Valley Bomb Squad Facility being the first of several new beginnings for the Department in 2008. February will see the opening of the new Metro Bomb Squad Facility, and other dedications are slated throughout the year, including the openings of replacement stations in Harbor, Rampart, and Hollenbeck Areas.

The event's Master of Ceremonies was Deputy Chief Michael Downing, Commanding Officer of Counter Terrorism and Incident Management Bureau. In high Department fashion,

the Posting of Colors was presented, the Pledge of Allegiance was recited, and the National Anthem was performed. Department Chaplain Kenneth Crawford led an invocation.

In 2007, the Police Commission prioritized and realized tangible results on the following: active and diversified recruitment; Consent Decree compliance; the TEAMS II risk man-

agement system, which is now up and running, strengthening the Department's ability to monitor employee trends before they become risk management issues; audit review resulting in significant changes in protocol and procedure, specifically the Command Accountability Perforsteadfast support for the Chief's goals, including gang reduction, crime reduction, homelessness reduction, and anti-terrorism preparedness. Specific issues, such as Skid Row and the Safer Cities Initiative also became a focus. And of course, this Commission granted Chief William Bratton a second five-year term to continue the outstanding work he has done here in Los Angeles.

Looking forward to 2008, this Commission would like to build upon these successes at the Los Angeles Police Department. As we all know, this City remains one of the most under-policed cities in the Country. While our crime statistics are outstanding, imagine what they would be like if we had more officers. This Commission will wholeheartedly support the momentum and keep hiring as many police officers as possible. We have that obligation to the people of this city, and we also have an obligation to build the force in a manner that reflects the ethnic diversity of Los Angeles.

As this Department moves forward in the era of accountability and openness, cameras in the cars are imperative for both the officers and the community members. While I mentioned the officers' radios as an accomplishment of this Commission, we still have budgetary problems with the aging hand held radio system and we are considering it a priority.

**DECEMBER 18:** The Commission approved the Department's \$1.5 billion Proposed Budget for Fiscal Year 2008/2009.

**DECEMBER 20:** The Commission unanimously approved a Special Order entitled "Confidential Financial Disclosure Policy and Procedures for Gang Enforcement Detail and Narcotics Field Enforcement Section Units Established." This Special Order is mandated by the Consent Decree. Police Commission President Anthony Pacheco stated, "The Police Commission has the utmost faith and confidence in the fine men and women of the LAPD. The unilateral implementation of a Financial Disclosure Program is not a sign of the lack of confidence in the sworn officers, rather a matter of compliance with the Consent Decree. This is one more step in making the Los Angeles Police Department the best law enforcement agency it can be."




## LAPD Officers Participate in Orange County Traffic Officers National Invitational Motor Challenge
