Monthly Crime Prevention Tip

This Holiday season, don't let the spirit of giving lull you into giving burglars, muggers, nor pickpockets a chance to do their dirty work. Criminals love the holidays as much as everyone else does, chiefly because it's a perfect opportunity to commit a crime. Keep these tips in mind for a safe and happy holiday season.

Here are some tips when you're shopping.

- Always carry your California Driver License or Identification Card along with necessary cash, checks and/or a credit card you expect to use.
- Even though you are rushed and thinking about a thousand things, stay alert of your surroundings.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.
- Pay for purchases with a check or credit card when possible.
- Keep cash in your front pocket.
- Notify the credit card issuer immediately if your credit card is lost, stolen or misused.
- Keep a record of all of your credit card numbers in a safe place at home.

Loud Parties

While peaceful family parties are part of our Southern California lifestyle, some parties are unlawful and even dangerous. In the past, young partygoers have been killed at residential parties that had been advertised by flyers at local high schools. Gang members enter the party and problems often can be fatal.

Potential party planners should be aware that it is illegal to charge admission for any party, to furnish alcohol to minors, to disturb the peace, quiet, and comfort of neighbors or to produce amplified music audible beyond 150 feet from the property line. They also need to remember that they are responsible for the nature of their party and the conduct of their partygoers.

Domestic Violence

Domestic violence is defined as abuse committed againsta spouse, cohabitant, former cohabitant, or a personwith whom the victim has had a child, or is having or hashad a dating or engagement relationship.

Domestic violence may begin with angry words, a shove, or a slap. It may escalate into a pattern of assaults and controlling behavior including physical, sexual and psychological attacks against the victim, children, property, and/or pets.

Research has shown that this pattern of control and abuse increases in frequency and severity over time. Studies have shown that arrest, jail, probation, and Restraining Orders deter many abusers from physically abusing their partners.

Current Crime Trends

The El Sereno basic car (4A9) had an increase in violent crime for the last four week extraction period (9-25-11/10-22-11). There were 12 reported violent crimes. Of these there were four robberies and seven aggravated assaults. Three of these robberies were

committed by the same suspects. Two males and a female suspect were arrested for multiple robberies, including additional crimes in other divisions. There were no patterns or similar suspects for the aggravated assaults.

Property crime remained almost the same with 25 crimes in this period. There were 11 GTA's (grand theft autos), seven burglaries five BTFV's (burglary or theft from vehicles) and two plain thefts. There were no patterns or similar suspects. The seven burglaries were unusually high. One of these burglaries was a "distraction burglary" where the suspects posed as utility workers.

If someone comes to your residence representing themselves as utility workers, demand I.D.

Hollenbeck Division is number one throughout the City in reduction of property and part-one crimes. We are minus 19.1 % in property crime and minus 18.3 % in part-one crime. We are also number four in crime reduction for violent crime with minus 15.8%

Crime Tip

If you own an older model Honda or Toyota please use some type of security device. These types of vehicles are frequently stolen. A steering wheel lock device is recommended.

For the month of October 2011, there was an increase in reported gang crimes, including a reported shooting on10/16/11at 4:25 a.m. in the 300 block of S. Avenue 19.The suspect approached the victim and asked him, "Whereare you from?" The suspect then shot multiple times at thevictim, striking the victim in the lower back. The victim is expected to recover from hisinjuries. Hollenbeckgang detectives are handling this crime.

Over the month of October, gang related graffiti has increased especially around Ave 18 and Ave 19 at Albion.LAPD is very aware that gang graffiti such as what has been observed in Lincoln Heights can lead to additional gang related crimes, such as shootings or worse.

Though we remove the graffiti as soon as we can, sometimeswe don't find it for several days, which is

why we are always seekingyour help for this type of crime.

Current Crime Trends

The current crime statistics reported that there was a slight increase in violent crime. The current statistics reported six violent crimes while the previous crime period reported five violent crimes. Keep in mind that his number is still very low.

Property Crime

There was a decrease in property crimes (i.e. Burglary, Grand Theft Auto, and Burglary from Motor Vehicle). There were 21 reported property crimes during this period as compared to 25 during the previous time period. The most commonly stolen vehicle in Hollenbeck continues to be Toyota's and Honda's.

Most of our violent crime is occurring between Cesar Chavez Blvd. and 6th St. and between Mott St. and the 5 freeway.

The majority of the property crime is occurring between Cesar Chavez Ave. and Whittier Blvd., Boyle Ave. and Euclid Ave. If you are aware of, or suspect someone of committing any of these crimes, please give me a call.

General Qualifications

Age Requirements:

You must be at least 18 years of age by day one of your first assignment. There is no maximum age limit for the Los Angeles Police Department Hollenbeck Area Volunteer Program.

Health:

You must be in good Health and free from conditions that would restrict your ability to perform all aspects of the Volunteer classifications.

Background:

You cannot have any serious police record or history of criminal or improper conduct, poor employment record, military or driving record which would affect suitability for volunteer work.

Training:

Hollenbeck Area Volunteers will receive training in;

Basic Law;

Volunteering for a law enforcement agency;

Police crime report writing;

Communicating with the public;

Assisting the Department in the event of civil unrest;

After successful completion of the Volunteer training, the citizen volunteer's job is to assist officers at the police station's front desk,and working alongside officers at community events.
