Hello Woodland Hills,

At a recent Press Conference on November 16, 2006, at Westfield Topanga Mall, the topic of discussion was crime suppression and new technology to help fight crime. Our Captain, along with Councilman Dennis Zine, and the Manager for the Westfield Mall discussed new technology that will allow us capture every license plate that enters or exits the mall parking lot. This technology, coupled with the two License Plate Reader vehicles we have at West Valley should reduce the number of crimes at the mall and in the surrounding areas. The cameras mounted on these vehicles automatically run every license plate in view. The system will immediately alert officers if the vehicle is wanted or stolen.

Channel 7 News along with other news stations covered this press conference, and they followed me around the parking lot as an experiment. We randomly picked a row of vehicles to look inside of for property targeted by thieves. Out of 10 vehicles we looked into, 7 had property left out in plain view. One vehicle left the moon roof completely open. Property included a laptop, checkbook, purse, briefcase, backpack, and a rolled up bunch of U.S. Currency sitting in the center console in clear view!

Please, Please, Please, help me to help you. Whenever you are parking your vehicles, please take everything out and place it in your trunk. If your vehicle does not have a trunk, at least cover the property with a blanket, a towel, or place it under the seats, but don't leave it out in plain sight.

Greetings everyone! This article is number two in a follow-up because there is a vast amount of information to cover. Hopefully, this information, **when applied**, will assist in preventing residential burglaries in the Canoga Park area. According to National Crime Prevention Statistics, one in twelve homes will be burglarized this year. Lets make sure that yours is not one of these.

Windows:

Sliding glass windows and doors can offer easy access if they are not properly secured. Sliding glass doors can be secured by installing commercially available locks or by placing a 'Charlie bar', which is an upgrade to the broomstick or dowel, in the inside track of the window. To prevent the windows from being lifted off the track, drill a hole through the sliding window frame and the fixed frame, then insert a pin in the hole. Double-hung sash windows are usually found in older homes and apartments. To secure these windows install commercially available key latch locks.

Louvered windows are the least secure and the easiest for burglars to enter because the glass panes can be removed so easily. If you have louvered windows consider replacing them with double glass windows. Another effective way to secure louvered windows is to install security bars. **However**, make sure the bars are designed to open from the inside of the home for escape in case of fire.

Alarm Systems:

If you do not have an alarm system please consider installing one. Most burglars will avoid a location that obviously has an alarm. Make sure your alarm company checks the system to avoid false alarms. False alarms are costly, both in fines for response, and in the fact that your neighbors won't pay attention to an alarm that is always going off.

Now if you do not have an alarm because it is cost prohibitive, consider making your home look like it has one anyway. You can post conspicuous alarm signs, and stickers on the windows that also indicate your home has armed security personnel response to your alarm activation.

Happy Holidays. Since most of us will be shopping during the holiday season, here are some important tips to prevent thieves from getting your information.

- Do not sign the back of your credit cards, instead put “photo ID required.” This will help put the burden of proof on the person accepting the credit card.
- When writing your checks to pay your credit cards, do not write the complete number of your account on the check. Just use the last four numbers of the account, the company knows the rest.
- Photocopy the contents of your wallet, both sides and retain a copy in a safe place in case you lose or get your wallet or purse stolen.
- Most importantly, contact the police and credit organizations immediately if your identity, purse or wallet get stolen. See the numbers below.

Statistics show that during the holiday season, there is a rise in crime. The following tips are provided to help you avoid becoming a victim when doing your holiday shopping:

- * Be sure you locate your keys and have them in hand prior to going to your car.
- * Beware of strangers approaching you for any reason. At this time of year, “con-artists” may try various methods of distracting you with the intention of taking your money or belongings.
- * Look confident and purposeful when you walk.
- * Keep a secure hold on your purse, handbag and parcels. Do not put them down or on top of the car in order to open your car door.
- * If threatened by someone in a car or on foot, scream, cross the street or run in the opposite direction toward people.
- * Always be aware of your surroundings. If suspicious activity is observed, or if you are the victim of a crime, obtain a description of the individual(s)’ physical appearance, actions, and any vehicle descriptions including license plate numbers, contact a security guard or the police immediately by calling 911 (emergency) or 877 ask-lapd (non-emergency). Do not confront suspicious individuals.
